
Lent 2024 CIRCUIT LIFE

I'd never come across this alternative version of the word 'kingdom' but I really like it – for a start it gets away from the gendered and heierarchical language which many find unhelpful and it also reminds us that the vision we pursue is to discover that we are all God's children, we are all kin and family, and to build a world that reflects that truth.

Remembering the reality of the world in 2023/2024

During November St Johns Church hosted a harp recital by Veronika Lemishenko a renowned Ukrainian harpist. She has now performed twice in gratitude for all that local people have done to support Ukrainian refugees. She will perform again at St John's in the spring. There are a number of people living in this area from the Ukraine, and some of us have got to know them well – people like Victoria and Nastya, who were hosted by Geoff and Barbara Tottle for well over a year at the start of the Russian invasion. In November Victoria's parents, Alexander and Tatiana, who live in rural Ukraine, where the winters can be very harsh, came over to Penmaenmawr to spend the winter with their family here. It was a delightful moment to welcome them to Carols under the Stars in Llanfairfechan.



At the beginning of December we also welcomed Rev'd David Hardman, the Methodist Liaison Officer based in Jerusalem. David was back in the UK because of the conflict in Israel / Palestine and he took the opportunity to travel around churches and share his experiences and insights. The event was entitled: 'We refuse to be enemies — Voices of Peace in the Holy Land.' It was well attended by our own folk and others from outside our Circuit and David talked us through the origins of the conflict and shared some stories of hope where people from either side of the many divisions in that land were coming together to build relationships instead of breaking them apart.



During Advent many of our churches left the second advent candle unlit to show support for people suffering in the Holy Land.



In Penmaenmawr, Anna Jane Evans, a Welsh minister and the Chair of the local CYTUN and a former Christian Aid regional organiser, carried a large roll of cloth around with her all winter from meeting to meeting on which she invited people to write the name of one of the thousands of children who have been killed in the Israel/Gaza conflict. This cloth took on the sense of a sacred object and kept all our Christmas services in their proper perspective. Those who wrote on the cloth took away a small slip of paper with the name of a child on. Many of us have these slips at home as a reminder of the terrible things that go on in this world and as a spur to become peacemakers in our own communities.



The churches of Burkina Faso, who wrote this year's Christian Unity material also brought to our attention the awful suffering of people in other parts of the world. Their choice of the Good Samaritan as the key bible passage reminded us of our duty as Christians to help all in need and to stand beside each other when forces of violence try to pull us apart. Wild Worship - Winter

On February 2nd we completed our round of four seasonal walks with reflection and worship. These have been really well supported with an average of around 15 people joining in each time. In the autumn we found ourselves near Cemaes on the north coats of Anglesey pondering rivers and tides. Our final jaunt was around Church Island on the Menai Straits.
